REFLECTION POINTS 3 JANUARY 2021

BIBLE READING - LUKE 2:41-52

41 Now every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the festival of the Passover. ⁴²And when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. ⁴³When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. ⁴⁴Assuming that he was in the group of travellers, they went a day's journey. Then they started to look for him among their relatives and friends. ⁴⁵When they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem to search for him. ⁴⁶After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. ⁴⁷And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. ⁴⁸When his parents saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, 'Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety.' ⁴⁹He said to them, 'Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' ⁵⁰But they did not understand what he said to them. ⁵¹Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart.

REFLECTION POINTS

Manningham Uniting has 4 values – you aim to be, in everything you do as a congregation, Christ-like, risk taking, hospitable and relational.

There's 3 contextual points to be aware of here: Emperor Augustus was 12 years old when he led a public oration for his grandmother's funeral By the time Jewish boys are 12 years old, they have begun studying the Torah To Romans, 'house' is not only the physical space but an indication of authority

The relational conversation Jesus has with the Jewish leaders and teachers: **sitting** amongst the teachers,

listening to them,

asking them questions.

spent time with them building up relationships of trust and mutual respect
